STANFORD EARLY CHILDHOOD PROGRAM

In 2025, we proudly opened a licensed Infant and Toddler Center at our newly renovated Stanford Early Childhood Program, expanding on 25 years of Early Learning Programs and deepening our commitment to the youngest learners in our community. Designed for children ages 6 to 24 months, the center responds to the growing demand for affordable, high-quality care, especially in Orange County where only 6% of eligible infants and toddlers are served through subsidized programs and over 5,900 children remain on childcare waitlists.

With capacity for up to 21 children, the Stanford Center offers full-day, dependable care led by experienced and nurturing teachers. This program helps bridge a critical gap for working families, many of whom face difficult choices due to the lack of available options.

Research shows that high-quality early care is a powerful foundation for success, improving school readiness, long-term academic achievement, and social-emotional development. Our investment in Early Childhood Programs reflects our unwavering support for children ages 0–5 years and the families who depend on us.

Boys & Girls Clubs of Garden Grove expanded its mental health services in 2025 by formally launching its Infant and Early Childhood Mental Health Consultation (IECMHC) program, made possible through funding from the County of Orange Health Care Agency.

Early mental health support plays a critical role in improving long-term outcomes and reducing the need for intensive, costly interventions later in life. The term “preschool to prison pipeline” refers to the troubling trend in which young children are pushed out of early learning environments through suspensions, expulsions, and other exclusionary discipline practices, increasing their likelihood of entering the juvenile justice system. Research shows that children who are suspended are ten times more likely to drop out of school, have lower academic achievement, and re-enter the discipline cycle, placing them on a trajectory towards incarceration.

This program strengthens the capacity of early childhood educators, providers, and program staff to support the social, emotional, and developmental well-being of children ages 0 to 8 years. Using a reflective practice model, Early Childhood Mental Health consultants work closely with teachers, administrators, and caregivers to address challenging behaviors, manage stress, and implement strategies that foster mental wellness in early learning settings.

Recognizing the powerful connection between a child’s well-being and the mental health of the adults in their lives, consultants also support caregivers and educators in developing self-regulation and co-regulation techniques. By equipping adults with these tools, we help create responsive, nurturing environments that allow children to thrive.

Through this effort, we are actively working to disrupt the preschool to prison pipeline by investing early where it matters most.

LEGO CHALLENGE 2

Garden Park partnered with National Association for Women in Construction for a second year to spark youth interest in construction careers. August M. won the building block challenge and went on to sweep the Regional Championship with a unanimous vote from all 8 judges - a first in the competition's history. His project now advances to the National Championship.

3 H.O.P.E. ENCORE

In May, Boys & Girls Clubs of Garden Grove held its first-ever ENCORE! Spring Concert, featuring 16 talented youth from elementary to high school. Through 10 solo and group performances, the event celebrated a season of hard work, growth, and musical achievement.

EPIC! 4

Thanks to a partnership with Garden Grove Unified School District, members are motivated to read more each day with EPIC!, a digital reading program. Readers are celebrated through the Reader of the Month program, which recognizes students from each grade for their effort and engagement.

5 ELEMENTARY SPORTS

During the 2024–2025 school year, we expanded our Athletics Program to include Elementary Soccer Leagues for 4th–6th grade Club members. Youth built soccer skills, practiced teamwork and sportsmanship, and competed for league titles where five schools were crowned champions. The program also prepares participants for our Intermediate Sports Program.

TEEN NIGHTS 6

BGCCG hosted fall and spring Teen Nights at Main Branch, inviting more than 100 teens from nine intermediate and three high schools for a night of fun and community building. The event featured a variety of engaging activities, including laser tag, go karts, and open mic in the HOPE Studio.

KEYSTONE

At Boys & Girls Clubs of Garden Grove, Keystone has been a vital program for developing teen leaders. Through leadership, service, and advocacy, Keystone empowers high school members to be a voice for their peers and role models for younger youth. This year, teens from Los Amigos, Rancho Alamitos, and Santiago High Schools proved that leadership isn't about titles, it's about showing up, stepping in, and making an impact. Across the three sites, over 30 members completed nearly 1,000 service hours.

Keystone teens took initiative on their campuses, planning and leading events that reflected the needs and interests of their peers. They also mentored younger students at nearby elementary and intermediate schools, fostering a culture of service across all age groups. By volunteering at BGCGG programs and helping run special events, they brought families and communities together in meaningful ways.

A standout moment was the "Breaking Down Bullying" Teen Summit, a youth-led event for intermediate students. Keystone members facilitated workshops, led open discussions, and created a safe, empowering space for 30 teens to explore identity, respect, and peer pressure. Through this summit, our teens showed that when given the opportunity, they rise to lead.

Keystone continues to shape future leaders who know leadership is rooted in service. Whether mentoring, advocating, or connecting campuses, Keystone teens are proving the next generation of leaders is already here and just getting started.

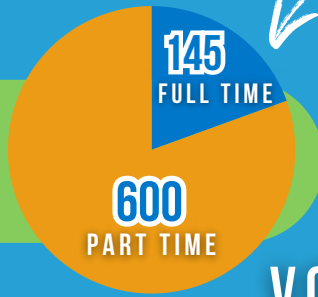
