Reduce Your Capital Gains Tax! See combined tax savings of up to 70% of your gift, when you donate appreciated stocks or mutual funds. Similar state tax benefits are also provided in most of the country.



For 76 years, Boys & Girls Clubs of America's Youth of the Year program has honored and celebrated the nation's most inspiring teens and their incredible journeys. These amazing young people represent the voice and spirit of hope for America. Inspiring all kids to lead. To succeed. To inspire. The Kiwanis Club of Garden Grove and KiwanisLand Park ioined as valued partners and presenting sponsors of the Youth of the Year program in the early 1970s.

Every month, each program site selects a Youth of the Month throughout the school year. In the spring, one youth is selected to represent the site as Youth of the Year. Youth of the Year candidates write short narratives and submit a recorded speech to a panel of judges. Of the 56 Youth of the Year candidates, 14 are selected as finalists.

All Youths of the Year are recognized at our annual Youth of the Year Award Celebration in April. BGCGG thanks Kiwanis Club of Garden Grove, Garden Grove Police Department, and HUB International for serving as youth sponsors for the 2024 Youth of the Year Award Celebration.

Most of our growth this past year has been realized in additional services to our youngest of members, as we have considerably expanded our 0 to 5 year-old program offerings and have

added new daily programs at a total of five additionally chartered school sites over the past 12-months. We have also made large investments in the improvement of our Club facilities as well as received full approval to begin the construction phase of our new Clubhouse at Patton Elementary. # **Family Campus Preschool**

We are celebrating 25 years of providing early childhood education programs to the families in Central Orange County. This program was created to help fill the needs of working families in the community seeking quality care for their

care for their children. It is our flagship early learning site that has paved the way for many other programs and

School Readiness Initiatives that focus on the 0-5 population and their families. This program not only placed us on the map as one of the few Boys & Girls Clubs in the nation serving children 0-5 but also helped create one of our early taglines 'From Diapers to Diplomas!' Family Campus preschool is

a licensed early care center serving children ages 18 months to 5 years of age. This program has served over 2,500 families with quality full day care for the last 25 years but also helped shaped our 'whole child' model of care.

In 2016, we partnered with Garden Grove Unified to start providing care for children who need morning and afternoon

care on preschool campuses. In 2022, we opened Clinton Corner our first Infant Care licensed site and our first Early Head Start location. In Fall 2024, we will continue to expand our Infant programs with the Grand Opening of our newly renovated Stanford Branch location.

# Re-Imagining Back-To-School

For most youth, August signals the end of summer and the start of preparing for going back to school. But what if, you haven't gone to school in a while and you aren't sure how you can get back in the routine?

Our Truancy Reduction Center paired up with ARCHES to host our annual Back to School event but Re-Imagined it for students who were part of our Countywide Truancy Mediation program. Families from throughout the County came to learn about targeted resources to help them be successful in returning to school. We brought in resources to address the top barriers to attending school, these included mental health professionals, substance use resources, mentoring programs, and health resources.

One teen who attended the back-to-school event with his mother was already connected to truancy mediation through their school district and mandated services. The student was introduced to Sunburst Youth Academy and shared this was something he may want to try.... fast forward almost a year this student will graduate Sunburst Youth Academy June 2024, is sober, and on track to graduate.

# How to Save a Life, BGCGG is Now Offering Naloxone Training

Safety has always been a number one priority for BGCGG and we continue to be proactive in our approach to providing staff with the most current and up to date safety practices, tools, and knowledge. That is why this past year we hosted a comprehensive Opioid Response Training. Our Staff received detailed information on Opioids/Fentanyl and the current statistics in Orange County from a panel of experts

Dr. Tram Hoang from Mercy Pharmacy shared the effects of Opioids, recognizing the signs and symptoms of an overdose, how to respond to an overdose emergency and how to give Naloxone. Officer Rene Barraza with Garden Grove Police Department shared real time local drug trends with youth in Orange County and Amy Neville of the Alexander Neville Foundation shared her personal experience of



loss and the human impact of fentanyl on youth and families. All staff present were trained in Naloxone administration and offered two free doses of Naloxone to have in case of an emergency.

# **Behavior Support Program**

A sense of belonging and inclusion is essential for any child to reach their full potential. In 2023, BGCGG launched a new initiative to better support inclusion of youth with intellectual and developmental disabilities through a grant opportunity with the Department of Developmental Services.

The Behavior Support Program provided additional training for Youth Development Professionals (YDPs) working with youth and challenging behaviors. In collaboration with Kids Included Together (KIT) and the Orange County Behavioral Health Training

Collaborative, YDPs were trained in Trauma-Informed Care, Inclusion Strategies, and Behavioral Support Techniques. All BGCGG sites were equipped with Calm Kits complete with sensory support tools to assist youth with regulating their emotions. Our members loved the weighted stuffed dogs, kinetic sand, and fidget tools!


# Staff/Volunteers


